What happens at National Conference?



NUS National Conference is the sovereign policy-making body of NUS.

Nearly 1000 delegates from students' unions across the country gather to discuss, debate and vote on motions and elect the political leadership of the organization for the year ahead.

Members submit policy proposals to National Conference – called Motions. The Democratic Procedures Committee ("DPC") puts these together into the Motions Document. This will be published here:

Motions are debated at the conference and voted on by delegates. Motions which pass become NUS UK Live Policy.

Before the conference, members vote for the order in which they want motions to discuss in the 'Priority Ballot'.

DPC facilitates and ensures the smooth running of the National Conference.

You'll see one of them sat with the Conference Chair to make sure motions get debated fairly and properly.

Other members of DPC sat at the front of the room are there to help interpret the articles and enforce the rules of conference.



Debate procedure

Debate procedures can be quite complicated if you haven't taken part before. To help you:

 Before Conference starts DPC will run a first time delegate training session in the morning to go over debate procedures and define key terms. This is really useful if it's your first time at Conference or if you just need a handy refresher!



- **DPC are available** on conference floor throughout Conference hours to help answer any questions you may have.
- NUS staff on **Information Point team** members will also be available during the whole event to help answer your queries.
- Videos of National Conference appear on <u>YouTube</u>. This is a great way to see previous National Conferences in action and get an understanding of how debates take place.



Voting on motions

- Motions are split into zones which categorise the issues.
- Discussing some of the motions before you arrive means you are prepared and have thought about the issues in relation to your own union.



- For each motion you'll hear speeches, some in favour and some against passing the motion.
- If you hear DPC say "we have parts", they mean a delegate has asked to discuss one section of a motion separately
- After the speeches, you will be asked to raise your voting card in the air at one of 3 times to show how you want to vote:
 - **For** if you want the motion to become policy
 - **Against** if you don't want the motion to become policy
 - Abstain if you don't understand the issue or don't believe NUS should have a stance on it



Elections and candidates

Elections at National Conference include the full-time officer positions, members of the National Executive Council (NEC) also known as the 'Block of 15', and positions on DPC and NUS UK Directors.

You will see people campaigning to get help get their preferred candidates elected – often seen wearing brightly coloured t-shirts! Before you arrive at Conference take a look at the candidates and discuss who you think is best for each job.



Candidates for National President will also have the opportunity to take part in Informal Hustings, where they answer questions submitted by delegates.

All candidates are allowed to give a speech on why you should vote for them just before the election takes place.



Voting in elections

When voting delegates arrive and register they will be issued with their **voting card** and **ballot papers**.

TIP – don't lose these, you can't vote without them!

When all candidates have delivered their election speeches, delegates will be instructed to fill in their ballot papers for the relevant position.

Delegates show their voting card and post their ballot paper in the ballot box as they leave conference floor.

The result will be announced as soon as possible once the votes have been counted.





Introducing Elections Committee...



Jules is the Chief Returning Officer. He is responsible for the good conduct and administration of elections to officer and committee positions within NUS.



Estelle, Kathy and **Rhodri** (left to right) are members of Elections Committee, who support the Chief Returning Officer in the running of fair and democratic elections.

A member of Elections Committee will chair Conference floor when elections are taking place.

NUS Code of Conduct


Be part of a healthy social media space
